DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY

DIRECTIVE 029

WHEREAS, in late 2019, the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention began monitoring an outbreak of respiratory illness caused by a novel coronavirus first identified in Wuhan, Hubei Province, China; and

WHEREAS, on February 11, 2020, the International Committee on Taxonomy of Viruses named this novel coronavirus "severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2);" and

WHEREAS, on February 11, 2020, the World Health Organization named the disease caused by SARS-CoV-2, "COVID-19;" and

WHEREAS, the World Health Organization advises that the novel coronavirus that causes COVID-19 virus is highly contagious, and spreads through respiratory transmission, and direct and indirect contact with infected persons and surfaces; and

WHEREAS, the World Health Organization advises that respiratory transmission occurs through both droplet and airborne transmission, where droplet transmission occurs when a person is within 6 feet of someone who has respiratory symptoms like coughing or sneezing, and airborne transmission may occur when aerosolized particles remain suspended in the air and is inhaled; and

WHEREAS, the World Health Organization advises that contact transmission occurs by direct contact with infected people or indirect contact with surfaces contaminated by the novel coronavirus; and

WHEREAS, some persons with COVID-19 may exhibit no symptoms but remain highly infectious; and

WHEREAS, on March 5, 2020, Clark County and Washoe County both reported the first known cases of COVID-19 in the State of Nevada; and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 12, 2020, I, Steve Sisolak, Governor of the State of Nevada issued a Declaration of Emergency to facilitate the State's response to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, Donald J. Trump, President of the United States declared a nationwide emergency pursuant to Sec. 501(b) of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. 5121-5207 (the "Stafford Act"); and

WHEREAS, on March 14, 2020, I formed a medical advisory team to provide medical guidance and scientifically based recommendations on measures Nevada could implement to better contain and mitigate the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, infectious disease and public health experts advised that minimizing interpersonal contact slows the rate at which the disease spreads, and is necessary to avoid overwhelming healthcare systems, commonly referred to as "flattening the curve"; and

WHEREAS, since the March 12, 2020 Declaration of Emergency, I have issued 28 Directives pursuant to that order to provide for the safety, wellbeing, and public health of Nevadans and the administration of the State of Nevada; and

WHEREAS, these Directives were promulgated to reduce interpersonal contact and promote social distancing to flatten the curve; and

WHEREAS, on April 30, 2020, I introduced the *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* plan that outlined a phased approach to reopening Nevada businesses and industry; and

WHEREAS, the *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* plan set forth a collaborative partnership between state and local governments that included the formation of the Local Empowerment Advisory Panel ("LEAP") to serve as a resource to local governments and local communities; and

WHEREAS, on May 9, 2020, the State of Nevada entered Phase One of the *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* plan; and

WHEREAS, on May 29, 2020, the State of Nevada entered Phase Two of the *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* plan; and

WHEREAS, prior to entering Phase Two, Nevada experienced a consistent and sustainable downward trajectory in the percentage of positive COVID-19 cases, a decrease in the trend of COVID-19 hospitalizations, and a decline in our cumulative test positivity rate from a maximum rate of 12.2% on April 24, 2020 to 6.3% on May 27, 2020 with a 33-day downward trend; and

WHEREAS, the intensity of COVID-19 infections in Nevada is exceedingly fluid. As of July 28, 2020, the State of Nevada has experienced over fifty days of an increasing trend of hospitalizations for confirmed COVID-19 cases; and

WHEREAS, as of July 28, 2020, the State of Nevada has experienced forty days of an increasing trend in its cumulative test positivity rate of COVID-19 cases; and

WHEREAS, as of July 28, 2020, there is no cure or vaccine for the COVID-19 disease; and

WHEREAS, because the virus causing COVID-19 is novel, scientific and medical treatment knowledge about the virus and how to limit its spread is improving regularly; and

WHEREAS, NRS 414.060 outlines powers and duties delegated to the Governor during the existence of a state of emergency, including without limitation, directing and controlling the conduct of the general public and the movement and cessation of movement of pedestrians and vehicular traffic during, before and after exercises or an emergency or disaster, public meetings or gatherings; and

WHEREAS, NRS 414.060(3)(f) provides that the administrative authority vested to the Governor in times of emergency may be delegated; and

WHEREAS, Article 5, Section 1 of the Nevada Constitution provides: "The supreme executive power of this State, shall be vested in a Chief Magistrate who shall be Governor of the State of Nevada;" and

NOW, THEREFORE, by the authority vested in me as Governor by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Nevada and the United States, and pursuant to the March 12, 2020, Emergency Declaration,

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:

SECTION 1: To the extent this Directive conflicts with earlier Directives or regulations promulgated pursuant to the March 12, 2020 Declaration of Emergency, the provisions of this Directive shall prevail.

SECTION 2: The *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* plan is hereby reaffirmed. This plan provides for a federally supported, state managed, and locally executed reopening approach, under which county governments and local municipalities are delegated the authority to impose additional COVID-19-related restrictions on businesses and public activities. Restrictions imposed by county government or local municipalities may exceed the standards imposed by Declaration of Emergency Directives and any State or federal guidelines to the extent reasonable, or set forth under the LEAP guidelines, but in no case shall such local guidelines be more permissive than the provisions of this Directive and the disease management plans it authorizes.

SECTION 3: The importance of the State's county and city governments committing significant energy, resources, and time to enforcing the provisions of this and previous directives and in mandating conformance with health and safety standards central to the continuing fight against COVID-19 is reaffirmed here in the strongest possible form. Local governments and individuals, businesses, and other organizations may adopt practices that exceed the standards imposed by Declaration of Emergency Directives and the disease management plans they authorize, guidelines promulgated by the Nevada State Occupational Safety and Health Administration (NV OSHA) or LEAP guidelines, but in no case shall business practices be more permissive than the provisions of this Directive, its authorized disease management plans, or those imposed by NV OSHA and the LEAP.

SECTION 4: All directives promulgated pursuant to the March 12, 2020 Declaration of Emergency or subsections thereof set to expire on July 31, 2020, shall remain in effect for the duration of the current state of emergency, unless terminated prior to that date by a subsequent directive or by operation of law associated with lifting the Declaration of Emergency. Of note, Phase Two of the *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* remains in effect. Directive 026, Section 8, extending Directive 021, Phase Two of the *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* plan, is hereby extended until the earlier of termination of these provisions by a subsequent directive or termination of the March 12, 2020 Declaration of Emergency to facilitate the State's response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

SECTION 5: The provisions of Section 4 do not extend to the recommencement of certain actions or directives, including Directive 025, previously terminated by express or implied order, or previously allowed to expire by operation of law.

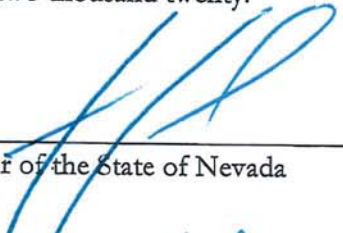
SECTION 6: Pursuant to NRS 414.060(3)(f), I hereby authorize and renew my call to all local, city, and county governments, and state agencies to enforce this Directive and regulations promulgated thereunder, including but not limited to, suspending licenses, revoking licenses, or issuing penalties for violating business, professional, liquor, tobacco, or gaming licenses issued by the local jurisdiction for actions that jeopardize the health, safety, or welfare of the public; conduct which may injuriously affect the public health, safety, or welfare; conduct that may be detrimental to the public peace, health, or morals; or any other applicable ordinance or requirement for such a license.

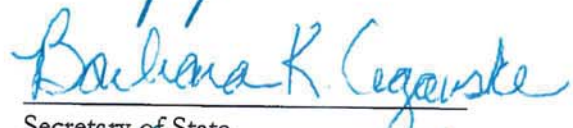
SECTION 7: The State of Nevada shall retain all authority vested in the Governor pursuant to NRS Chapter 414.

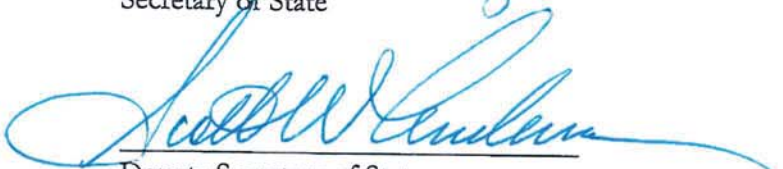
SECTION 8: This Directive is effective at 11:59 p.m. on Friday, July 31, 2020 and shall remain in effect until terminated by a subsequent directive promulgated pursuant to the March 12, 2020 Declaration of Emergency, or dissolution or lifting of the Declaration of Emergency itself, to facilitate the State's response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

1. Call to Order and Roll Call

Chair David Fogerson, Division of Emergency Management and Homeland Security (DEM/HS), called the meeting to order. Roll call was performed by Sherrean Whipple, DEM. Quorum was established for the meeting.

2. Public Comment

Chair Fogerson opened the first period of public comment for discussion. There was no public comment.

3. Approval of Minutes

Chair Fogerson called for a motion to amend or approve the draft minutes of the January 29, 2021 Nevada Resilience Advisory Committee (NRAC) meeting. Misty Robinson, Senior Public Health Preparedness Planner, moved to approve the minutes and Andrea Esp, Washoe County Public Healthcare Liaison, seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

4. Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) Application

Kelli Anderson, DEM, updated the Committee on the status of the EMPG application. They received the notice of funding opportunity on February 25th at the state level, which the jurisdiction should have received via email. On March 4, they had their first meeting with FEMA, who described the NOFO changes and work plan expectations. DEM and FEMA have been working on outcome oriented performance goals to include project development and training exercises and ensuring an integrated preparedness plan.

This year, EMPG has several deadlines. DEM is currently preparing its priorities for the state and also releasing the application through Zoom Grants for the application period. The application for local jurisdictions is due on April 16, and the application then goes to FEMA on April 30. The final application will be submitted May 14.

DEM has two upcoming technical assistance calls. One is Thursday at 1:00 pm, and the other is the following Thursday at 1:00 pm.

Jeremy Hynds, City of Henderson Emergency Manager, asked whether local jurisdictions have to follow strictly the priorities that the state is developing. Ms. Anderson said that in the application, it is required for jurisdictions to pick one top priority out of the three the state has listed. Those include disaster housing, logistics and distribution, and energy reduction.

5. State Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2021 Application

Kelli Anderson, DEM, updated the Committee on the HSGP for SHSP and UASI funding. The SHSP received \$4,602,500 and UASI received \$5,250,000. The priority investments are cybersecurity, soft targets in crowded places, intelligence sharing, combating domestic violence, and addressing emerging threats. All five are required to be focused on, with a required percentage of funds attached to each.

The application was released on March 15th and is due on March 29th. The final application submission date is May 24th.

Ms. Anderson added that the day of this meeting, the technical assistance call would take place over Zoom.

Vice-Chair Samuels asked whether Ms. Anderson would be able to record her meeting so that occupied Committee members would be able to view it at a later time. Ms. Anderson affirmed. Chair Fogerson asked whether the video could be posted to the website, and this was also affirmed.

6. Urban Area Working Group (UAWG) Meeting Review

Deputy Chief Billy Samuels updated the Committee on the latest UAWG meeting. UAWG added two project changes, both for the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. The first was their fusion center, and the second one was for the RCCP. Both were unanimously approved.

The first major change to UASI is the removal the competitive piece to it. The second is that they are now ranking UASI 1 to 30 instead of 1 to 77.

7. Discussion to Create a Mitigation Committee

Chair David Fogerson opened discussion on the creation of a mitigation committee under the Division of Emergency Management that would report directly to Chair Fogerson in an advisory capacity. This group would focus on advising on hazard mitigation and providing assistance to local jurisdictions. Chair Fogerson created the committee. The committee will be subject to the open meeting law and all rules and regulations but will be a committee separate from NRAC.

Bunny Bishop, Chief of Water Planning and Drought Resiliency, commented that she supports the creation of the mitigation committee.

Chair Fogerson noted that the committee would take considerable pressure off of the single employee currently trying to do all the mitigation work herself.

Jeremy Hynds asked for clarification on whether this committee would be a sub-committee under NRAC or a separate committee. Chair Fogerson clarified that it would be a separate committee.

Jeremy Hynds asked whether the committee will be a travelling one that meets northern, central, and southern Nevada. Chair Fogerson indicated that once COVID is over, the committee can travel to greater Nevada.

8. Discussion of Current Legislative Efforts Impacting Emergency Management

Chair, David Fogerson. Chair Fogerson led a discussion on legislative efforts impacting emergency management in the State of Nevada, including, an overview of the current status of Bill Draft Requests (BDR) submitted by the Division of Emergency Management. This presentation included the following items:

- Senate Bill 14 – Revises provisions relating to certain emergency response plans and assessments. This bill has passed the committee and has gone to the Senate as a whole. They are currently reviewing it. This bill changes some of the requirements for water purveyors or whether they're included in the Homeland Security Plan requirements, and if they are, how to submit the plans to the DEM through the secure portal, and how the DEM provides information back. There is currently another bill from some legislators trying to exempt some water purveyors due to other regulations.
- Assembly Bill 14 – Revise provisions relating to emergency management. This bill has passed the committee and has changed the meeting schedules for several committees to meeting once a quarter or at the call of the Chair.
- BDR 1103 - Related to the reorganization of the Division of Emergency Management. This BDR moves the DEM in its entirety from under the Department of Public Safety to the Department of the Military. DEM structure remains the same.

9. COVID-19 Pandemic Response and Recovery Update

Jon Bakkedahl, DEM, updated NRAC on the current status of DEM response to COVID-19, including coordination and resource allocation efforts taken to support local governments. Mr. Bakkedahl stated that the first matter was the acquisition of Mobile Vaccine Units (MVUs). DEM has made the request to FEMA for two and has been granted both. DEM is developing a plan to serve both northern and southern Nevada, coordinating with PHP.

DEM also acquired permission to extend its warehouse in northern Nevada lease programs for another six to twelve months while the DEM attempts to downsize the amount of PPE they have collected for emergencies. DEM plans to work with the federal government on state purchasing of large quantities, to allow jurisdictions access to PPE at significantly lower prices.

The warehouse also have over 2 million viral transport media and over 2 million swabs for testing.

The Division of Public and Behavioral Health will be running the warehouse operations as DEM moves forward.

Malinda Southard, Public Health Preparedness Program Manager, expressed appreciation for the partnership with DEM and immunization in the community.

10. Recommendation on the Development of Strategic Capacities to be Maintained (SCTBM) for the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2021 Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP)

Chair David Fogerson gave a recommendation on the SCTBM for the FFY21 HSGP. This was recently reviewed by the Nevada Commission of Homeland Security Committee (NCHS) on Finance. The same three capacities that NRAC looked at last month and the month before are in this recommendation. The only difference is that the Committee on Finance built two emerging strategic capacities and removed the capacity for the voting system as an emerging threat capacity to be maintained because the grant guidance did not require it. Chair Fogerson's recommendation to the Committee is that they adopt these capacities.

Jeremy Hynds asked why Henderson's teams were not represented on the recommendation. Chair Fogerson explained that urban counties are included in a single category. Also meant by rural frontier parts include Churchill, Elko, and Humboldt teams.

Chair Fogerson made a motion to adopt the strategic capacity to be maintained as seen in the handout that came from the NCHS Committee on Finance.

Mr. Hynds asked whether the strategic capacities on the list are in association with the ones that the UASI and HSGP are asking the Committee to follow. Kelli Anderson stated that some of the Committee's work already folds into the top five priority investments set by the HSGP.

Malinda Southard asked how they would know what to look for, with regard to programs and core capabilities, involving public health, healthcare, and EMS. Chair Fogerson pointed out that during and after a terrorist attack, there is significant disaster and injury fallout. This is not a recurring or automatic process but shows that the Committee is looking at the medical side of terrorism events.

Chair Fogerson made a motion to adopt the strategic capacity to be maintained as seen in the handout that came from the NCHS Committee on Finance. Chris Lake, Executive Director of Community Resilience, seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

11. Public Comment

Chair Fogerson left public comment open for two minutes to allow for the lag between the live feed and the YouTube feed. There was no public comment.

12. Adjourn

Chair Fogerson called for a motion to adjourn. Noah Boyer, Deputy of the Northern Nevada Federal task Force, made a motion to adjourn, and Kelly Echeverria, Washoe County Program Coordinator, seconded. The motion passed unanimously, and Chair Fogerson adjourned the meeting.

To sustain and maintain planning through continuity of operations (COOP) and continuity of government (COG) for agencies Statewide. This is a request to continue sustainment efforts and capabilities for this statewide project. During the initial phase of this project plans were developed for Counties, Cities, and Tribes throughout Northern Nevada. During Phase 2 of the project, sustainment began with Northern Nevada local government, while continuity plans were created for Clark County Metro to demonstrate the value of continuity plans for Southern Nevada terrorism preparedness, the City of Henderson, and the Moapa Tribe. The 3rd phase of the project completed additional State agencies and the City of Las Vegas. The 4th phase of the project focused on the UASI jurisdictions of Clark County, Clark County School District, and the Southern Nevada Health District; and continued the efforts to ensure that participants are trained to update plans, have access to planning tools, and refine continuity plans in the State of Nevada. The 5th phase added North Las Vegas and the University of Nevada, Reno. Phase 6 developed Elko County and UNLV COOP plans. Phase 7 added Truckee Meadows Community College (TMCC) and Southern Nevada College (SNC). Phase 8 will include Las Vegas Paiute Tribe Health and Human Services (LVPT HHS) and Washoe County Human Services, Our Place Campus in addition to securing the continued use of the planning tool through September 2023. This phase will continue the project through the fiscal year 2023.

When selecting this year's COOP planning vendor, additional tasks will be included in the Scope of Work (SOW). Plans-writers will work one-on-one with jurisdictions and agencies to update and sustain the plans to ensure that they are successful. Our project includes the purchase of a portable x-ray system, this system can be used to screen bags and packages at screening checkpoints at soft target and crowded places. This system can also be used to screen unattended or suspicious packages and bags at soft targets and crowded locations.

The remainder of our project is to fund SCBA equipment, wire attack and diagnostics equipment, remote firing devices, and an observation robot. All of these items in our project will be used as personal protective equipment, diagnostic equipment and render safe tools to address improvised explosives devices or suspected weapons of mass destruction.

The Consolidated Bomb Squad is used in response to credible threats to conduct screening, search and detection operations of packages or items that could contain possible improvised explosive devices. The requested equipment would allow us to respond to suspected improvised explosive devices and conduct remote and render safe operations. The equipment would expand our capability to integrate bomb technicians into a tactical environment such as an active shooter type event.

Yes - The Consolidated Bomb Squad is responsible for responding to explosive devices and suspicious packages and rendering safe these devices. Explosive devices have been favored by terrorist groups to cause large areas of geographic damage as well as significant death tolls and casualties to further their terrorist ideology. Explosives have been possessed or used in the greater Northern Nevada area by persons associated with sovereign citizens or terrorist groups.

The Consolidated Bomb Squad based in Reno, Nevada covers an area of responsibility of over 27,500 square miles consisting of Humboldt, Pershing, Churchill, Storey and the second most populated county in the state, Washoe County. The Consolidated Bomb Squad is part of a Federal Task Force that responds to all of Northern Nevada and includes a small area in California. Our project outcome is to maintain and improve our operational effectiveness and expand our dismounted operational capabilities as well as operate in a Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosives (CBRNE) environment on supplied air or self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA). Additionally, this will address safety concerns by replacing outdated SCBA equipment currently used by the Consolidated Bomb Squad which encompasses Washoe County Sheriff's Office, Reno Police Department, and Sparks Police Department.

In 2018 the Consolidated Bomb Squad began the process of replacing outdated x-ray equipment that is no longer supported by the manufacturer. This project request includes part of the scaled replacement plan. The requested digital x-ray system would allow for dismounted operation deployment to large scale events and would allow for x-ray capability to be integrated into the tactical environment and expand improvised explosive device (IED) interrogation capabilities.

As the current IED threat has evolved squads have had to adapt to these ever-changing situations. The requested IED Electronic diagnostic and defeat equipment allows for expanded capabilities to address complex IED electronic circuitry and perform manual render safe techniques.

Lastly, our project includes the purchase of a man portable robotic observation platform. This robot is capable of being deployed by one person and operated in a dismounted or tactical environment. This robot allows for first responders to conduct information gathering from a safe distance and allow for rapid intelligence in dynamic situations

As a critical component of the United States homeland security and counter-terrorism enterprise and the National Network Of Fusion Centers, the purpose of the Nevada Threat Analysis Center is to receive, analyze,

disseminate and gather information from and to share intelligence with state, local, tribal and federal partners in an effort to deter, detect, prevent and/or mitigate terrorism and other criminal activity. The funding requested is intended to sustain NTAC programs, operations, and staffing in accordance with the fusion center baseline capabilities and critical operating capabilities.

The direction, planning, analysis, production, dissemination and feedback is accomplished by 25 full time employees, which include 21 state funded employees and 4 contractors. The employees include: 4 Sworn DPS Officers (including 1 Lieutenant, 1 State Trooper assigned as the NTAC Privacy Officer/Security Officer, 1 Sergeant assigned to Safe Voice, and 1 Detective assigned to the Southern Nevada Counterterrorism Center); 1 Deputy Director, 3 DPS Intelligence Analysts, 1 DPS Senior Intelligence Analyst, 2 Intelligence Analysts (contractors), 1 DPS Administrative Assistant, 1 Fusion Liaison Officer Coordinator (contractor), and 1 Critical Infrastructure Coordinator (contractor). The NTAC also operates the SafeVoice Communications Center on behalf of the Nevada Department of Education, which has 12 full-time staff (2 supervisors, 10 communication specialists). The funding requested is vital to the Nevada Threat Analysis Center's ability to sustain fusion center Baseline and Core Operating Capabilities, which are significant and necessary components to successful Intelligence production and Information sharing in the State of Nevada. Including support to the identified FFY 2021 National Priorities.

This project goes hand in hand with the active shooter component of the Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) and Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR). Bomb squad response to active shooter incidents are essential to mitigate the common threat of IED at these incidents. This project will allow the TDBS to have all response vehicles equipped with dismounted X-ray capabilities. The project will allow us to search and interrogate a large amount of suspicious items at incidents in a reasonable amount of time.

The TDBS and the bombs squad across the state including our federal partners have the sole responsibility to mitigate these incidents

This project would maintain and enhance the TDBS capabilities for X-ray interrogation and dismounted operations. The improvement of the digital X-ray technology allows the bomb squads to rapidly X-ray multiple devices with smaller amounts of pulses. This would allow teams deployed to move faster through an active shooter environment and have less of an impact on current X-ray generators. If a IED was located the team would be able to render safe the IED through dismounted operations. This project would allow TDBS and CBS to have the same capabilities, this would allow both squads work together in a mutual aid incident. Batteries would be interchangeable, dismounted teams would have continuity of equipment, and the familiarity of the equipment would allow the team members to work together independent of their squads. This would only enhance the interoperability of the 12 bomb technicians in the Reno/Tahoe operational area and throughout the State of Nevada if called upon to do so.

The project is to maintain the response capabilities of the Triad Regional Response Team by replacing aging monitoring equipment. Though not officially a "typed" team, the TRIAD strives to maintain the highest response level possible through planning, training, and appropriate equipment replacement. With advancing technologies, many manufactures stop supporting older analog technology which forces the purchase of new equipment. The project specifically addresses replacing various types of detection devices with differing detection methods. This enables for proper prevention, protection, mitigation, response and recovery of risks within Washoe County and throughout the State.

There are numerous Tier II sites within the County, along major roadways, railway, airport and the waterways including Lake Tahoe and the Truckee River that could potentially have a release that would cause a catastrophic impact to the community, population and the environment. . Schools and other facilities also have materials that require such equipment to detect and accurately identify. There are many different substances that fall into these categories that require specialized equipment to detect, identify and provide vital information to responders, planners, officials and the public. Hazmat release/ chemicals are identified as a Threat of concern in the THIRA.

Yes.

The TRIAD is an all risk, non-typed, Regional HazMat Response Team for Washoe County that responds to all hazards including HazMat and CBRNE events. As the primary responder for the County, the TRIAD is responsible for highway, rail, air and pipeline incidents. As the primary responders, the TRIAD coordinates with the Consolidated Bomb Squad and the Clear Team for regional support for protecting Washoe County's infrastructure against possible terrorist type activity.

The goal of the Washoe County TRIAD/ HazMat CBRNE is to continuing replacing the existing monitors and detectors that are aging and will no longer be supported in the future.

The TRIAD Regional Hazardous Materials Team is the primary responder for Washoe County. It consists of over 100 personnel from Reno FD, Sparks FD and Truckee Meadows Fire Protection District, that is capable of responding outside of the County and still be able to handle a level I incident within the local jurisdiction. The Team regularly responds to incidents where hazmat/CBRNE is located. With the expanding call volume and the rapid changes in technology, the TRIAD is in need of upgrading equipment and increase training of personnel in the future.

With the increased threats against infrastructure, the increase transport of hazardous and CBRNE materials including radiological WIPP shipments, the increase in mass casualty incidents and the threats at special events, the Team is in need of this equipment to properly protect the public and to coordinate with other local and State agencies if needed.

Information Technology (IT) resource threats include unidentified suspects, malicious data and /or physical disasters making systems unavailable. Malicious activity and data loss, monitoring, planning, responding to data disaster recovery are primary mission components. We aim to bridge the gap between cyber threat and cyber response capability through the purchase and implementation of software, hardware, and services; develop and implement activities and to identify threat events timely through continuous monitoring and corroboration. All Nevada law enforcement benefits from the State's secure infrastructure and security systems. The project is to protect Department of Public Safety CJIS operations. The Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) and Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR) key findings indicate the continued need for cybersecurity. The project directly addresses THIRA and SPR.

The Cybersecurity FIPS 140-3 Cryptography Support Project implements the federal information processing standard security requirements for Nevada DPS CJIS Operations. Enterprise IT Services in the Department of Administration is to install FIPS 140-3 cryptography services at the State Computer Facility in Carson City, NV to protect Department of Public Safety's technology infrastructure against cyber terrorism and malicious interference. Cryptographic modules are comprised of the hardware, software, and firmware performing encryption, authentication, digital signature, and key management services provided by the cryptographic module. More than web traffic, data streams are protected from cyber threat actors and state sponsored attackers gaining unauthorized access. The outcome is to include tamper evident seals applied during installation. Once enabled, system integrity checks, crypto algorithm checks and other checks will be performed by the system.

When CJI is transmitted outside the boundary of the physically secure location, the data shall be immediately protected via encryption. In 2019 and 2020 the NNRAC awarded the project 50 Geoshield Licenses to the Northern Nevada Regional Intelligence Center (Hereinafter NNRIC). To maintain capacities, we have absorbed some of those licensing requirements into our annual operating expenditures and are in the process of further expanding current information sharing capabilities. NNRIC is working with DPS Records and Compliance for access to other data sources to better share information statewide utilizing the Geoshield platform. Embedded in this platform is Gun-operations analytics connecting crimes across the state and jurisdictional boundaries ensuring safety and making our community more resilient to crimes of gun violence. NNRIC continues to see regional collaboration and success between the Cities of Reno and Sparks, Washoe County, Nevada HIDTA, ATF, FBI, USSS and DEA. Our collaborative hub of information sharing in the state proved invaluable during the Social Justice Movement and summer of unrest.

The NNRIC Geoshield program is currently implemented. These monies will further enhance current capabilities and address the ability to better access and share critical information from across the region in an organized and timely manner. With additional data sources, analyst level real time event status, and stratified policing crime reduction strategies we will be more effective and efficient in our delivery of services. The project will be managed by the NNRIC Director with technical assistance from the NNRIC Senior Business Systems Analyst.

More robust searching platforms allow analysts the ability to quickly find, validate, and disseminate information across the state.

The Washoe County Sheriff's Office NNRIC is the largest intelligence center in Northern Nevada with 15 dedicated full-time personnel representing the Reno Police Department, the Sparks Police Department, Washoe County Sheriff's Office, Nevada High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas, and the Consolidated Bomb Squad. The ability to provide real-time intelligence in the furtherance of on-going investigations is paramount to a timely and comprehensive intervention. The longer threats and violent offenders are unidentified, the more havoc and devastation they instill on our communities. The ability for a regional hub to combine data and resources from three large metropolitan hubs is invaluable to the resources on the street. Geoshield combines data from several locations for the officer on the street. The ability to search multiple databases under one umbrella is critical for identifying offender locations and previous contact with law enforcement. Geoshield also compiles raw data and displays it across geographic areas to identify deployable resources where they are needed most.

This investment will allow county election officials to improve and maintain the security of their public facing networks, which will advance the state's goal to increase security of these networks. The IDS sensor monitoring that will be funded by this investment specifically serves as a detection system to notify county election officials of malicious attempts to access their network. Regarding intelligence and information sharing, part of the monitoring service includes notification of malicious attempts to access the network.

Yes. One of the goals of terrorism is to cause people to lose confidence in the government. Accordingly, a terrorist organization may target voter registration systems with the goal of causing people to not have faith in the results of an election. This project will protect voter registration systems from malicious attacks, including attacks from terrorist organizations.

The goal of this project is to increase the cybersecurity of county-based voter registration systems through the monitoring of an Intrusion Detection System (IDS), including netflow monitoring, of election system networks in the following Nevada counties: Churchill, Elko, Esmeralda, Eureka, Humboldt, Lander, Lincoln, Mineral, Nye, Pershing, Storey, and White Pine. The remaining five Nevada counties (Douglas, Lyon, Carson City, Washoe, and Clark) already have IDS and netflow monitoring and analysis available to them through funding provided by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS). IDS and netflow monitoring and analysis provide local governments with a near real-time automated process that identifies and alerts on traditional and advanced threats on a network, facilitating rapid response to cyber threats and attacks. IDS and netflow monitoring and analysis will enhance the cybersecurity capability of the Nevada's smallest counties as it relates to elections. Nevada is what is known as a "bottom-up" state, which means that each county election office maintains its own voter registration database. As evidenced by activity that occurred in other states in the lead up to the 2016 presidential election, voter registration databases are prime targets for identity thieves and those wishing to undermine democratic election processes. Unfortunately, many of Nevada's smallest counties do not have the technical expertise or financial resources to enhance their election system's network security by implementing a robust security apparatus.

Access control and identity verification enhancements to the building will provide a safer, more secure emergency operation site and increased protection against physical threats.

This project proposal is for the build out of a Technical Response Vehicle (TRV) to be operated by the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department (LVMPD) Technical and Surveillance Squad (TASS). The vehicle will be equipped to deploy a mobile ad hoc network (MANET) that is capable of streaming deploying a series of cameras and sensors, to include a UAV, for the purpose of collecting real-time situational intelligence and streaming the information back to a command post to aid with incident command for an event. The first TRV was purchased in 2019 and has quickly proven to be an invaluable regional resource for a coordinated response to a terrorism or mass casualty event. Like the first TRV, this TRV will be self-contained and be capable of deploying a mobile ad hoc network (MANET) to provide real-time situational awareness to a command post or unified command in the event of a major incident. Using the mobile ad hoc network, the LVMPD Technical and Surveillance Squad (TASS) is able to deploy a variety of sensors on the network to include surveillance cameras, body worn cameras, and air-to-ground video links from a UAV or other type of aircraft even if no other infrastructure exists. The TRV serves as an aggregation point for the data and is capable of rebroadcasting the information to other command vehicles in the area and/or the Fusion Center. The secondary TRV eliminates the possibility of having a single point of failure and increases the ability for TASS to support multiple events should the need arise.
