STATE OF NEVADA MEETING NOTICE AND AGENDA NEVADA COMMISSION ON HOMELAND SECURITY

Pursuant to Section 1 of the Declaration of Emergency Directive 006 signed March 12, 2020, as extended by Declaration of Emergency Directive 029, signed July 31, 2020, the requirement contained in Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) 241.023(1)(b) that there be a physical location designated for meetings of public bodies where members of the public are permitted to attend and participate is suspended due to the COVID-19 emergency. Please see Attachment A. This meeting will be teleconferenced beginning at 10:00 a.m.

The Nevada Commission on Homeland Security (Commission) may act on items marked "For Possible Action." Items may be taken out of the order presented on the agenda at the discretion of the Chair. Items may be combined for consideration by the Commission at the discretion of the Chair. Items may be pulled or removed from the agenda at any time.

Please Note: Witnesses wishing to have their complete testimony/handouts included in the permanent record of this meeting should provide a written or electronic copy to the Commission administrative support staff. Minutes of the meeting are produced in a summary format and are not verbatim.

1. **Call to Order and Roll Call** – Chair, Governor Steve Sisolak.
2. **Public Comment** – (Discussion Only) – No action may be taken upon a matter raised under this item of the agenda until the matter itself has been specifically included on an agenda as an item upon which action may be taken. Public comments may be limited to three minutes per person at the discretion of the Chair. Comments will not be restricted based on viewpoint.

Because there is no physical location for this meeting, public testimony under this agenda item may be presented by phone or in written form.

3. **Approval of Minutes** – (Discussion/For Possible Action) – Chair, Governor Steve Sisolak. The Commission will discuss and review the minutes of the March 30, 2021, Commission meeting. The Commission may vote to amend and approve or approve the minutes as provided.
4. **Report on the Statewide Adoption of the National Incident Management System** – (Discussion Only) – David Fogerson, Division of Emergency Management and Homeland Security (DEM/HS), State Administrative Agent (SAA). The Commission will be briefed on the quarterly report on the statewide adoption of, and compliance with, the National Incident Management System, as required by Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) 239C.310.
5. **Request to Reallocate Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) Funds – (Discussion/For Possible Action)** – David Fogerson, SAA. This item will address Project Change Requests (PCRs) from the Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) as discussed at the February 16, 2021, Urban Area Working Group (UAWG) meeting, and reviewed by the Committee on Finance on May 3, 2021. The Commission will review the Committee on Finance recommendation to approve these PCRs and may vote to amend and approve or approve the recommendations as provided.
 - **NCHS-167:** Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department (LVMPD) – Fusion Center (FFY19 UASI) – Fusion Center UASI Sustain Project - This request is to move \$200,558.87 in unused funds from the Strip Camera Maintenance Contract, Trapware, Omega Arm, and cancelled conferences for the International Association of Crime Analysts (IACA), International Association of Law Enforcement Intelligence Analysts (IALEIA), and Foundations of Intelligence Analysis Training (FIAT) to pay for the Coplink renewal.
 - **NCHS-168:** Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department – Fusion Center (FFY19 UASI) – LVMPD Russell Corridor Camera Project This request is to move \$65,052.91 from Miscellaneous Supplies to Network and Wireless Equipment.
6. **Review and Update on the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2021 Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) Process and Allocations** – (Discussion Only) – David Fogerson, SAA and Deputy Chief Billy Samuels, Urban Area Administrator (UAA). The Commission will hear an update on the FFY 2021 HSGP federal funding allocations to Nevada. The Commission will also hear a report on the process and outcome from the April 8, 2021, Nevada Resilience Advisory Committee (NRAC) meeting and the April 26, 2021, Urban Area Working Group (UAWG) meeting(s) formulating the subsequent funding recommendations to the Committee on Finance for the FFY 2021 grant allocation to Nevada.
7. **Final Review of Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2021 Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) Funding Recommendations** – (Discussion/For Possible Action) – Sheriff Joseph Lombardo, Committee on Finance Chair. Sheriff Lombardo, or his designee, will provide a briefing on the results of the May 3, 2021, Committee on Finance meeting where budgets and projects for the FFY 2021 HSGP, as recommended by the NRAC and UAWG, were discussed. This briefing will include recommendations to the Commission for final funding of FFY 2021 HSGP projects including those projects which may not be recommended for funding. The Commission will be asked to review the Committee on Finance recommendations and may vote to amend and approve or approve as presented. A final recommendation will be forwarded to the SAA regarding the FFY 2021 HSGP grant application. A list of the FFY21 HSGP project submissions is provided in Attachment B.

8. **Public Comment** – (Discussion Only) – No action may be taken upon a matter raised under this item of the agenda until the matter itself has been specifically included on an agenda as an item upon which action may be taken. Public comments may be limited to three minutes per person at the discretion of the Chair. Comments will not be restricted based on viewpoint.

DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY

DIRECTIVE 029

WHEREAS, in late 2019, the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention began monitoring an outbreak of respiratory illness caused by a novel coronavirus first identified in Wuhan, Hubei Province, China; and

WHEREAS, on February 11, 2020, the International Committee on Taxonomy of Viruses named this novel coronavirus "severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2);" and

WHEREAS, on February 11, 2020, the World Health Organization named the disease caused by SARS-CoV-2, "COVID-19;" and

WHEREAS, the World Health Organization advises that the novel coronavirus that causes COVID-19 virus is highly contagious, and spreads through respiratory transmission, and direct and indirect contact with infected persons and surfaces; and

WHEREAS, the World Health Organization advises that respiratory transmission occurs through both droplet and airborne transmission, where droplet transmission occurs when a person is within 6 feet of someone who has respiratory symptoms like coughing or sneezing, and airborne transmission may occur when aerosolized particles remain suspended in the air and is inhaled; and

WHEREAS, the World Health Organization advises that contact transmission occurs by direct contact with infected people or indirect contact with surfaces contaminated by the novel coronavirus; and

WHEREAS, some persons with COVID-19 may exhibit no symptoms but remain highly infectious; and

WHEREAS, on March 5, 2020, Clark County and Washoe County both reported the first known cases of COVID-19 in the State of Nevada; and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 12, 2020, I, Steve Sisolak, Governor of the State of Nevada issued a Declaration of Emergency to facilitate the State's response to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, Donald J. Trump, President of the United States declared a nationwide emergency pursuant to Sec. 501(b) of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. 5121-5207 (the “Stafford Act”); and

WHEREAS, on March 14, 2020, I formed a medical advisory team to provide medical guidance and scientifically based recommendations on measures Nevada could implement to better contain and mitigate the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, infectious disease and public health experts advised that minimizing interpersonal contact slows the rate at which the disease spreads, and is necessary to avoid overwhelming healthcare systems, commonly referred to as “flattening the curve”; and

WHEREAS, since the March 12, 2020 Declaration of Emergency, I have issued 28 Directives pursuant to that order to provide for the safety, wellbeing, and public health of Nevadans and the administration of the State of Nevada; and

WHEREAS, these Directives were promulgated to reduce interpersonal contact and promote social distancing to flatten the curve; and

WHEREAS, on April 30, 2020, I introduced the *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* plan that outlined a phased approach to reopening Nevada businesses and industry; and

WHEREAS, the *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* plan set forth a collaborative partnership between state and local governments that included the formation of the Local Empowerment Advisory Panel (“LEAP”) to serve as a resource to local governments and local communities; and

WHEREAS, on May 9, 2020, the State of Nevada entered Phase One of the *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* plan; and

WHEREAS, on May 29, 2020, the State of Nevada entered Phase Two of the *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* plan; and

WHEREAS, prior to entering Phase Two, Nevada experienced a consistent and sustainable downward trajectory in the percentage of positive COVID-19 cases, a decrease in the trend of COVID-19 hospitalizations, and a decline in our cumulative test positivity rate from a maximum rate of 12.2% on April 24, 2020 to 6.3% on May 27, 2020 with a 33-day downward trend; and

WHEREAS, the intensity of COVID-19 infections in Nevada is exceedingly fluid. As of July 28, 2020, the State of Nevada has experienced over fifty days of an increasing trend of hospitalizations for confirmed COVID-19 cases; and

WHEREAS, as of July 28, 2020, the State of Nevada has experienced forty days of an increasing trend in its cumulative test positivity rate of COVID-19 cases; and

WHEREAS, as of July 28, 2020, there is no cure or vaccine for the COVID-19 disease; and

WHEREAS, because the virus causing COVID-19 is novel, scientific and medical treatment knowledge about the virus and how to limit its spread is improving regularly; and

WHEREAS, NRS 414.060 outlines powers and duties delegated to the Governor during the existence of a state of emergency, including without limitation, directing and controlling the conduct of the general public and the movement and cessation of movement of pedestrians and vehicular traffic during, before and after exercises or an emergency or disaster, public meetings or gatherings; and

WHEREAS, NRS 414.060(3)(f) provides that the administrative authority vested to the Governor in times of emergency may be delegated; and

WHEREAS, Article 5, Section 1 of the Nevada Constitution provides: “The supreme executive power of this State, shall be vested in a Chief Magistrate who shall be Governor of the State of Nevada;” and

NOW, THEREFORE, by the authority vested in me as Governor by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Nevada and the United States, and pursuant to the March 12, 2020, Emergency Declaration,

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:

SECTION 1: To the extent this Directive conflicts with earlier Directives or regulations promulgated pursuant to the March 12, 2020 Declaration of Emergency, the provisions of this Directive shall prevail.

SECTION 2: The *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* plan is hereby reaffirmed. This plan provides for a federally supported, state managed, and locally executed reopening approach, under which county governments and local municipalities are delegated the authority to impose additional COVID-19-related restrictions on businesses and public activities. Restrictions imposed by county government or local municipalities may exceed the standards imposed by Declaration of Emergency Directives and any State or federal guidelines to the extent reasonable, or set forth under the LEAP guidelines, but in no case shall such local guidelines be more permissive than the provisions of this Directive and the disease management plans it authorizes.

SECTION 3: The importance of the State’s county and city governments committing significant energy, resources, and time to enforcing the provisions of this and previous directives and in mandating conformance with health and safety standards central to the continuing fight against COVID-19 is reaffirmed here in the strongest possible form. Local governments and individuals, businesses, and other organizations may adopt practices that exceed the standards imposed by Declaration of Emergency Directives and the disease management plans they authorize, guidelines promulgated by the Nevada State Occupational Safety and Health Administration (NV OSHA) or LEAP guidelines, but in no case shall business practices be more permissive than the provisions of this Directive, its authorized disease management plans, or those imposed by NV OSHA and the LEAP.

SECTION 4: All directives promulgated pursuant to the March 12, 2020 Declaration of Emergency or subsections thereof set to expire on July 31, 2020, shall remain in effect for the duration of the current state of emergency, unless terminated prior to that date by a subsequent directive or by operation of law associated with lifting the Declaration of Emergency. Of note, Phase Two of the *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* remains in effect. Directive 026, Section 8, extending Directive 021, Phase Two of the *Nevada United: Roadmap to Recovery* plan, is hereby extended until the earlier of termination of these provisions by a subsequent directive or termination of the March 12, 2020 Declaration of Emergency to facilitate the State’s response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

SECTION 5: The provisions of Section 4 do not extend to the recommencement of certain actions or directives, including Directive 025, previously terminated by express or implied order, or previously allowed to expire by operation of law.

SECTION 6: Pursuant to NRS 414.060(3)(f), I hereby authorize and renew my call to all local, city, and county governments, and state agencies to enforce this Directive and regulations promulgated thereunder, including but not limited to, suspending licenses, revoking licenses, or issuing penalties for violating business, professional, liquor, tobacco, or gaming licenses issued by the local jurisdiction for actions that jeopardize the health, safety, or welfare of the public; conduct which may injuriously affect the public health, safety, or welfare; conduct that may be detrimental to the public peace, health, or morals; or any other applicable ordinance or requirement for such a license.

SECTION 7: The State of Nevada shall retain all authority vested in the Governor pursuant to NRS Chapter 414.

SECTION 8: This Directive is effective at 11:59 p.m. on Friday, July 31, 2020 and shall remain in effect until terminated by a subsequent directive promulgated pursuant to the March 12, 2020 Declaration of Emergency, or dissolution or lifting of the Declaration of Emergency itself, to facilitate the State's response to the COVID-19 pandemic.





1. Call to Order and Roll Call

Governor Steve Sisolak called the meeting to order. Roll call was performed by Karen Hall, Nevada Division of Emergency Management and Homeland Security (DEM/HS). Quorum was established for the meeting.

2. Public Comment

Governor Sisolak opened the first period of public comment for discussion. No public comment was presented.

3. Approval of Minutes

Governor Sisolak called for a motion to amend or approve the draft minutes from the December 23, 2020, Nevada Commission on Homeland Security (Commission) meeting. Dr. Ikram Khan, Quality Care Consultants, motioned to approve the minutes as presented, and Mitch Fox, Nevada Broadcasters Association, seconded the motion. All were in favor with no opposition. The motion passed unanimously.

4. Report on the Statewide Adoption of the National Incident Management System

Chief David Fogerson, DEM/HS, provided the quarterly report on the Statewide Adoption of the National Incident Management System (NIMS) as required by Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) 239C.310. This year, there have been two distinct areas of progress made in the adoption of NIMS. A statewide meeting was held to develop a plan for Nevada's local governments to meet the needs of clients. Additionally, many NIMS classes have been taught, and Nevada is one of the few states to continue to provide NIMS education during the

pandemic while ensuring safety protocols. Lead partners in Nevada casinos have offered larger event rooms to ensure the continuation of the NIMS process, and DEM/HS has engaged a contractor who worked on the NIMS framework on its behalf. While there are several frameworks for other emergency management areas, there is no preparedness framework, so the contractor will work with current goals and objectives to create such a framework. Governor Sisolak called for any questions regarding the report. No questions were presented.

5. Update on the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2021 Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) Process

Chief Fogerson updated the Commission on the current FFY 2021 HSGP process noting that the application deadline closed at midnight on March 29, 2021. 54 applications were received, and the total amount of funding requested was approximately \$11,000,00. Nevada received an allocation of approximately \$10,000 in FFY 2021. For perspective, a total of 73 applications were received, and the total amount of funding requested was approximately \$13,000,000. Chief Fogerson is hopeful that the process will be quicker this year because of the reduced number of applications received.

DEM/HS staff will focus on ways to enhance the grant application process, and the review of the applications received will commence with the NRAC, the Committee on Finance, and finally the Commission for final FFY 2021 HSGP funding approval. The goal is to have this process completed by the end of April 2021 to ensure time for the final grant application to be completed by the deadline.

As the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the federal Department of Homeland Security (DHS) release many of their grants simultaneously, there are multiple timelines and requirements to be met. DEM/HS staff, applicants, and local jurisdictions are working on those grant applications. Chief Fogerson referred to the timeline handout provided for the Commission members.

Governor Sisolak called for any questions on this report. Chief John Steinbeck, Clark County Fire Department, asked about the minimum requirements for the State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) and Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) funding streams, and whether the applications received have met any minimum requirements indicated for priority investment justifications such as cybersecurity. Chief Fogerson responded that there were specific national investment priorities in FFY 2021 including 7.5% for enhancing cybersecurity, 5% for soft targets and crowded places, 5% for enhancing information and intelligence sharing (fusion center model), 7.5% to combat domestic violent extremism, and 5% for addressing emerging threats. Chief Fogerson indicated that DEM/HS feels comfortable that the applications received cover these requirements, although a full review has yet to be completed. This will be part of an ongoing discussion during the next NRAC meeting.

6. Recommendation on the Amendment of Strategic Capacities to be Maintained (SCTBM) for the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2021 Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP)

Chief Fogerson provided an update on a recommended amendment to the existing Strategic Capacities to be Maintained (SCTBM) for FFY 2021. During the last Commission meeting, it was requested that the SCTBM be reviewed again to ensure priorities were in line with the current needs for the state and that projects being funded were essential to Nevada security. A second review was performed by the NRAC and the Committee on Finance. The only change made from the Committee on Finance and the NRAC is that the previous version approved by this Commission had two emerging threats: Public Health, Healthcare, and Emergency Medical Services and Election Security. After a review of the FFY 2021 HSGP federal guidelines, the consensus was that Election Security was covered under cybersecurity and was no longer listed as a national priority in the guidance. The Committee on Finance and NRAC voted to remove Election Security as an emerging capacity, but to leave Public Health, Healthcare, and Emergency Medical Services as an emerging capacity. Chief Fogerson indicated he had spoken with the Nevada Secretary of State staff to ensure they are comfortable with that emerging capacity being removed, and they were comfortable with that decision.

The recommendation before the Commission is to approve the amended SCTBM as presented. Governor Sisolak called for questions on the recommendation. Hearing none, the Governor called for a motion to approve the amendment. Dr. Khan made a motion to approve the amendment as presented with no changes, and, and Chief Steinbeck seconded the motion. All were in favor with no opposition. The motion passed unanimously.

7. Public Comment

Governor Sisolak opened the second period of public comment for discussion. No public comment was presented.

8. Adjourn

Governor Sisolak called for a motion to adjourn. Mitch Fox made the motion to adjourn, and Patricia Wade, Wade Development, seconded the motion. All were in favor with no opposition. The meeting was adjourned.



Our project includes the purchase of a portable x-ray system, this system can be used to screen bags and packages at screening checkpoints at soft target and crowded places. This system can also be used to screen unattended or suspicious packages and bags at soft targets and crowded locations.

The remainder of our project is to fund SCBA equipment, wire attack and diagnostics equipment, remote firing devices, and an observation robot. All of these items in our project will be used as personal protective equipment, diagnostic equipment and render safe tools to address improvised explosives devices or suspected weapons of mass destruction.

The Consolidated Bomb Squad is used in response to credible threats to conduct screening, search and detection operations of packages or items that could contain possible improvised explosive devices. The requested equipment would allow us to respond to suspected improvised explosive devices and conduct remote and render safe operations. The equipment would expand our capability to integrate bomb technicians into a tactical environment such as an active shooter type event.

Yes - The Consolidated Bomb Squad is responsible for responding to explosive devices and suspicious packages and rendering safe these devices. Explosive devices have been favored by terrorist groups to cause large areas of geographic damage as well as significant death tolls and casualties to further their terrorist ideology. Explosives have been possessed or used in the greater Northern Nevada area by persons associated with sovereign citizens or terrorist groups.

The Consolidated Bomb Squad based in Reno, Nevada covers an area of responsibility of over 27,500 square miles consisting of Humboldt, Pershing, Churchill, Storey and the second most populated county in the state, Washoe County. The Consolidated Bomb Squad is part of a Federal Task Force that responds to all of Northern Nevada and includes a small area in California. Our project outcome is to maintain and improve our operational effectiveness and expand our dismounted operational capabilities as well as operate in a Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosives (CBRNE) environment on supplied air or self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA). Additionally, this will address safety concerns by replacing outdated SCBA equipment currently used by the Consolidated Bomb Squad which encompasses Washoe County Sheriff's Office, Reno Police Department, and Sparks Police Department.

In 2018 the Consolidated Bomb Squad began the process of replacing outdated x-ray equipment that is no longer supported by the manufacturer. This project request includes part of the scaled replacement plan. The requested digital x-ray system would allow for dismounted operation deployment to large scale events and would allow for x-ray capability to be integrated into the tactical environment and expand improvised explosive device (IED) interrogation capabilities.

As the current IED threat has evolved squads have had to adapt to these ever-changing situations. The requested IED Electronic diagnostic and defeat equipment allows for expanded capabilities to address complex IED electronic circuitry and perform manual render safe techniques.

Lastly, our project includes the purchase of a man portable robotic observation platform. This robot is capable of being deployed by one person and operated in a dismounted or tactical environment. This robot allows for first responders to conduct information gathering from a safe distance and allow for rapid intelligence in dynamic situations

This project goes hand in hand with the active shooter component of the Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) and Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR). Bomb squad response to active shooter incidents are essential to mitigate the common threat of IED at these incidents. This project will allow the TDBS to have all response vehicles equipped with dismounted X-ray capabilities. The project will allow us to search and interrogate a large amount of suspicious items at incidents in a reasonable amount of time.

Yes, the threat of terrorist IED bombing on the homeland is a real threat. The TDBS and the bombs squad across the state including our federal partners have the sole responsibility to mitigate these incidents

This project would maintain and enhance the TDBS capabilities for X-ray interrogation and dismounted operations. The improvement of the digital X-ray technology allows the bomb squads to rapidly X-ray multiple devices with smaller amounts of pulses. This would allow teams deployed to move faster through an active shooter environment and have less of an impact on current X-ray generators. If a IED was located the team would be able to render safe the IED through dismounted operations. This project would allow TDBS and CBS to have the same capabilities, this would allow both squads work together in a mutual aid incident. Batteries would be interchangeable, dismounted teams would have continuity of equipment, and the familiarity of the equipment would allow the team members to work together independent of their squads. This would only enhance the interoperability of the 12 bomb technicians in the Reno/Tahoe operational area and throughout the State of Nevada if called upon to do so.

It consists of over 100 personnel from Reno FD, Sparks FD and Truckee Meadows Fire Protection District, that is capable of responding outside of the County and still be able to handle a level I incident within the local jurisdiction. The Team regularly responds to incidents where hazmat/CBRNE is located. With the expanding call volume and the rapid changes in technology, the TRIAD is in need of upgrading equipment and increase training of personnel in the future.

To maintain capacities, we have absorbed some of those licensing requirements into our annual operating expenditures and are in the process of further expanding current information sharing capabilities. NNRIC is working with DPS Records and Compliance for access to other data sources to better share information statewide utilizing the Geoshield platform. Embedded in this platform is Gun-operations analytics connecting crimes across the state and jurisdictional boundaries ensuring safety and making our community more resilient to crimes of gun violence. NNRIC continues to see regional collaboration and success between the Cities of Reno and Sparks, Washoe County, Nevada HIDTA, ATF, FBI, USSS and DEA. Our collaborative hub of information sharing in the state proved invaluable during the Social Justice Movement and summer of unrest.

With additional data sources, analyst level real time event status, and stratified policing crime reduction strategies we will be more effective and efficient in our delivery of services. The project will be managed by the NNRIC Director with technical assistance from the NNRIC Senior Business Systems Analyst.

The Washoe County Sheriff's Office NNRIC is the largest intelligence center in Northern Nevada with 15 dedicated full-time personnel representing the Reno Police Department, the Sparks Police Department, Washoe County Sheriff's Office, Nevada High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas, and the Consolidated Bomb Squad. The ability to provide real-time intelligence in the furtherance of on-going investigations is paramount to a timely and comprehensive intervention. The longer threats and violent offenders are unidentified, the more havoc and devastation they instill on our communities. The ability for a regional hub to combine data and resources from three large metropolitan hubs is invaluable to the resources on the street. Geoshield combines data from several locations for the officer on the street. The ability to search multiple databases under one umbrella is critical for identifying offender locations and previous contact with law enforcement. Geoshield also compiles raw data and displays it across geographic areas to identify deployable resources where they are needed most.

The goal of this project is to increase the cybersecurity of county-based voter registration systems through the monitoring of an Intrusion Detection System (IDS), including netflow monitoring, of election system networks in the following Nevada counties: Churchill, Elko, Esmeralda, Eureka, Humboldt, Lander, Lincoln, Mineral, Nye, Pershing, Storey, and White Pine. The remaining five Nevada counties (Douglas, Lyon, Carson City, Washoe, and Clark) already have IDS and netflow monitoring and analysis available to them through funding provided by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS). IDS and netflow monitoring and analysis provide local governments with a near real-time automated process that identifies and alerts on traditional and advanced threats on a network, facilitating rapid response to cyber threats and attacks. IDS and netflow monitoring and analysis will enhance the cybersecurity capability of the Nevada's smallest counties as it relates to elections. Nevada is what is known as a "bottom-up" state, which means that each county election office maintains its own voter registration database. As evidenced by activity that occurred in other states in the lead up to the 2016 presidential election, voter registration databases are prime targets for identity thieves and those wishing to undermine democratic election processes. Unfortunately, many of Nevada's smallest counties do not have the technical expertise or financial resources to enhance their election system's network security by implementing a robust security apparatus.

This project proposal is for the build out of a Technical Response Vehicle (TRV) to be operated by the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department (LVMPD) Technical and Surveillance Squad (TASS). The vehicle will be equipped to deploy a mobile ad hoc network (MANET) that is capable of streaming deploying a series of cameras and sensors, to include a UAV, for the purpose of collecting real-time situational intelligence and streaming the information back to a command post to aid with incident command for an event. The TRV is mobile in nature and can be deployed anywhere in the state. This vehicle would strategically be deployed for pre-planned special events, and response to critical incidents located at soft target locations. LVMPD is seeking to build out a secondary Technical Response Vehicle (TRV). The first TRV was purchased in 2019 and has quickly proven to be an invaluable regional resource for a coordinated response to a terrorism or mass casualty event. Like the first TRV, this TRV will be self-contained and be capable of deploying a mobile ad hoc network (MANET) to provide real-time situational awareness to a command post or unified command in the event of a major incident. Using the mobile ad hoc network, the LVMPD Technical and Surveillance Squad (TASS) is able to deploy a variety of sensors on the network to include surveillance cameras, body worn cameras, and air-to-ground video links from a UAV or other type of aircraft even if no other infrastructure exists. The TRV serves as an aggregation point for the data and is capable of rebroadcasting the information to other command vehicles in the area and/or the Fusion Center. The secondary TRV eliminates the possibility of having a single point of failure and increases the ability for TASS to support multiple events should the need arise. The city of Las Vegas has operated a mass notification system since 2005. The original system consisted of a locally-based server with out-of-area back-up capacity in the event a catastrophic emergency left the local system unusable. With the advent of "cloud" technology, the city has moved away from a local-based server to a subscription-based technology providing added assurance the emergency public information and warning capacity will exist when needed. Since the mass shooting attack in Las Vegas on 1 October 2017, local law enforcement, specifically the Southern Nevada Counter Terrorism Center, has learned more of what this existing system can provide, both from a Public Warning standpoint as well as an Intelligence and Information Sharing perspective. This increased interest in more frequent use of this system has created a requirement for the city to expand the current system capabilities from a per-unit usage system to an unlimited call, text, email system.

The robotic platform requested is specifically designed for tactical robotic operations providing a rugged platform that can be utilized for search and surveillance inside of a structure or residence. The unit will also be critical in response to terrorist type events. Due to the random location of these events the platform needs to be diverse in its functionality and deployment. By employing the new robotic platform, the expanded capabilities and maneuverability of this robot will enhance the effectiveness and efficiency for searching and communicating with dangerous individuals or groups that are barricaded in a variety of locations.

License plate reader (LPR) technology is a tool which helps the SNCTC accomplish their goals. LPR technology works through the use of camera technology that captures images of license plates that come within the camera's field of view. The technologies associated algorithms help the software identify the actual license plate by reading the letter and number sequence of the license plate and making sense of it all. That information becomes a detection of a license plate. Often, the system works by capturing two separate images. The first image is of the license plate itself. The second image is a collateral image capturing a greater field of view and providing the consumer an image area surrounding the license plate. This data is then transferred via cellular to be stored in the cloud. Historical detections of license plates can be researched to fuel investigations. This data enhances the intelligence and information sharing components located within the Las Vegas valley.

The leveraging of advancements technologies, combined with the development of technology-based crime fighting strategies offers law enforcement an unprecedented opportunity to prevent violence before it occurs. The deployment of said technology within areas of value and interest is likely to have a significant impact on the prevention of violence and terrorism. The purpose of this proposal is to procure a second Phase of the LPR technology in and around tourist corridor located within downtown Las Vegas, NV.

Project implementation will involve deployment of LPR cameras in and around the downtown Las Vegas corridor administered by the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department (LVMPD), the host agency for the Southern Nevada Counter Terrorism Center (SNCTC). In addition to the staff already assigned to the SNCTC, there exists a unit, Fusion Watch, which is responsible for the deployment of advanced technologies to combat terrorism. Additionally, LVMPD has an existing License Plate Reader program administered by a program manager.

The North Las Vegas Tactical Medic Team would provide emergency medical response to events resulting from domestic violent extremism. The team would also be part of the initial medical care to an event resulting from the emerging threat of WMD. Tactical medics provide care in areas not yet rendered safe for fire service and EMS medical providers. Traditionally, these responders operate in the "cold zone" of incidents. Tactical medics complete rigorous training and awareness programs enabling them to operate in "hot" and "warm zones" prior to law enforcement rendering an area completely safe. This response gap results in an extended time to patient contact that has, on many occasions, led to victims of the event treating other victims without the aid of professional medical providers. This response gap occurs at a critical time of the event where life-saving interventions must occur to increase survivability of victims.

11. Describe the investment or project, specifically how it addresses gaps and/or sustainment in the Threat and Hazard Identification Risk Assessment (THIRA)/Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR).

This question is specifically asked in the Investment Justification.

The Threat and Hazard Identification Risk Assessment (THIRA)/Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR) identifies Active shooter and hostile Mass Casualty events as a high priority in Step 1 and 2. Due to their expanded training and specialized gear, Tactical Medics are able to enter areas not currently addressed in the initial onset phase of these types of incidents. As part of the current MACTAC and SNFO Hostile Event response, deployment of Rescue Task Force (RTF) teams may only occur when four conditions are satisfied. These four "Must Have's" are defined as, an established Unified Command, a completed threat assessment, a defined warm zone and confirmed victims. Tactical medics would have the training and ability to join law enforcement units making entry into the event perimeter prior to these conditions being met to begin reconnaissance and assessment of the scene in terms of medical and evacuation needs. Due to the team being comprised of active duty firefighters, the team would also be available to positively affect Step 3 of the THIRA relating to "structural firefighting and on-scene security, protection and law". This would be in addition to their primary function which directly assists in the mitigation and response to Step 3 "public health, healthcare and emergency medical".

Yes. The NLV Tactical Medical team would also expand the capabilities of the NLVPD SWAT team. The response and assistance of NLVPD Personnel with the necessary skills and equipment played a pivotal role during the October 1, 2017 mass shooting event on Las Vegas Blvd. Tactical Medics would provide hot zone medical capability to terror-related events prior to RTF entry.

The purpose of this grant is to enhance the capability of the Las Vegas Valley to respond to a Multi-threat, All-Hazard incident requiring the deployment of highly trained and equipped Law Enforcement and Medical personnel. The City of North Las Vegas and the

surrounding communities of Clark County face a growing number of significant threats to their residents and critical infrastructure. These threats, inclusive of terrorist acts involving Weapons of Mass Destruction, natural disasters, violent crime and mass shootings require first responders to be prepared for any critical incidents that may occur in the region. To better help prepare for such incidents, the North Las Vegas Police Department (NLVPD) maintains a highly trained SWAT Team capable of response to all high-risk critical events that occur within the city and throughout the Southern NV Region. NLVPD SWAT has been involved in numerous high-risk incidents that show this jurisdiction's vulnerability. Recent incidents include the containment and apprehension of suspects armed with a wide array of weapons who pose an active threat to the community and hostage situations that required the approach, engagement and entry of structures in both rural and urban environments. Casualties in the hostile environment require timely evaluation, assessment, life-saving immediate treatment and removal.

Upon notice of award, the NLVFD and NLVPD SWAT team will begin procurement bid process for body armor, communications equipment, gas masks, medical bags, training adjuncts and medical supplies following established DEM, NRS and NLV purchasing policy and procedures. NLVFD BC John Wright and NLVPD SWAT Lt. Brucken will work with Finance and Purchasing to initiate a competitive bid process including establishing RFP requirements, requesting bids, and making final determinations. Once vendors have been selected, equipment specifications will be finalized and the order will be placed. Upon delivery of the equipment, NLVFD and NLVPD SWAT will provide necessary training to the selected fire department personnel covering the following specialized subjects: Care Under Fire, Triage and Treatment in Hostile Environments, Advanced Bleeding Control, Care Over the Barrier, Remote Assessment, Specialized Medical Equipment and Procedures, Explosive Breaching Familiarization, Hostage Rescue Operations, Tactical Movement, Downed Officer Rescue, Weapons Familiarization and Safety, Less Lethal Weapon Familiarization, Gas Mask Familiarization, Body Armor Removal, K-9 Operations, Cover and Concealment, Firefighting in the Hostile Environment and Advanced Vehicle Operations. Once

training is complete the team will be operational. Ongoing training will be handled by the departments to keep the team in a state of operational readiness.

The proposed project aligns with the selected national priority due to the identified North Las Vegas water sites currently being soft, unprotected targets. These sites are easily accessible, vulnerable to attacks using simple tactics and readily available weapons, and would cause major disruption if targeted. With attacks on water systems increasing across the country, securing these infrastructure assets is vital to keeping our citizens safe and the critical water lifeline protected. The Fire Administration Building, which houses the North Las Vegas EOC, is also a critically important soft target in need of enhanced hardening.

Clean, safe drinking water is one of the most important lifelines a community has, both before and after a catastrophic event. Drinking water distribution systems are increasingly vulnerable to interruption in service from a terrorist attack, extreme weather events, and aging water infrastructure. In the Las Vegas THIRA water is listed as one of the six life lines; any disruption or attack on any of or "soft target" reservoirs or pump stations will negatively impact three critical areas identified in the THIRA: Water treatment and provision, waste water sanitation, and Fire Management and Suppression. This project seeks to enhance security to protect these soft targets.

Yes, Both foreign and domestic terrorists are increasingly targeting water systems due to their importance and generally under-protected nature. Water infrastructure impacts the flow of safe drinking water and the protection of sanitary wastewater systems. Compromised water systems can have catastrophic negative health and safety effects that impact not only the water lifeline, but also fire protection, hospital usage, and industrial operations. The EOC is critical to terrorism response.

The goal of this project is to harden critical infrastructure targets by installing cameras, motion sensors, physical barriers, and water quality security measures at 20 water utility sites in addition to the NLV Fire Administration building (FAB), which houses the NLV EOC. Water utility sites are increasingly becoming a target for both domestic and foreign terrorists due to their importance and relatively low security thresholds. The identified water sites are currently unprotected and located throughout the North Las Vegas jurisdiction. A January 2021 attack on the Oldsmar, Florida water treatment facility brought the importance of water security into the national spotlight. In the past 5 years the hub of NLV's water utility operation at Ft. Sumter has been routinely burglarized by numerous trespassers who have stolen vehicles and supplies. These examples demonstrate the lack of current security and the need to upgrade measures not only at the utility hub, but at the actual water reservoirs, wells, and treatment facilities to ensure the public's safety. Funding will also be used to add security cameras to the FAB/EOC. This was a specific vulnerability identified by DHS in a 2019 Infrastructure Survey Tool (IST) report. The system will integrate with the City's enterprise security system and provide much needed surveillance. The total projected cost for the security enhancements is \$800,000, and CNLV will be providing \$400,000 in local funding to leverage UASI dollars and expand the capacity of the security enhancement. The 245,000 residents who rely on the North Las Vegas water utility are the direct beneficiaries of this project, which safeguards their water lifeline and mitigates risks associated with a contaminated or eliminated water and sewer supply. This project also benefits our regional partners whose water system NLV would depend on if our own water system was compromised due to lack of security measures.

Implementation will be managed by team of two project managers representing the IT (cameras, tech) and Public Works (walls, fencing) departments. This project enhances the protection of soft targets and crowded places through prevention and mitigation. The unanchored vehicle stop barriers can be rapidly deployed and serve as hostile vehicle mitigation and a primary security system for entry points and roadways for, but not limited to:

Currently, UPD does not have the ability to quickly implement hostile vehicle mitigation. This product will provide us with a means to quickly close down roads and/or harden targets to prevent or reduce the damage a vehicle, if used as a weapon, may cause. Used as a perimeter barrier device it will serve to create a safe area between the event & vehicles. UNLV regularly hosts national, state, and regional events, including 2016 Presidential Debate, Governor bill signing ceremony, October 1 response and recovery, Federal Appeals and Nevada Supreme Court visits, National Finals Rodeo, NBA Summer League, and a COVID-19 Vaccine Point of Dispensing site; with over a million visitors annually. UPD and the Office of Emergency Management's common campus purpose is to sustain and build systems that will prepare for, respond to, and recover from any threat which may face our campus, keeping our students and staff, campus visitors, event attendees, and surrounding community safe and secure. The need has been identified for enhanced security at multiple high profile events and will reduce potential risks identified during the broader planning process.

According to the 12/17/03 Homeland Security Presidential Directive 7 which established a national policy to identify & prioritize critical infrastructure & key resources to protect them from terrorist attacks; the Department of Homeland Security & Congress identified public assembly facilities as part of this critical infrastructure. These anti-vehicle barriers will serve as a counter-terrorism & security measure, to prevent or reduce the amount of harm a vehicle, used as a weapon, may cause.

Being in close proximity to the Las Vegas Strip, the University of Nevada, Las Vegas (UNLV) venues share similar threats and hazards and are a potential target for terrorism and other man-made emergencies. Security threats identified in previous semesters have led us to conclude that the current systems in place around UNLV are not adequate to support the growing number of visitors to the educational, sporting, and entertainment events held each year. To improve safety and security for these events and venues, we are proposing the purchase of an 8-vehicle barrier system to reduce man-made risks associated with these activities and assist in securing entry-points, roadways, and perimeters. Additionally, these barriers will predominantly be used locally throughout Clark County and may be utilized by partner agencies throughout the Urban Area as University Police Services (UPD) Southern Command has existing Interlocal Agreements with local law enforcement agencies regarding resource sharing and mutual aid. These barriers may also be used by UPD Northern Command and Washoe County, if warranted. Establishing these enhanced security measures will significantly reduce risks associated with high profile events held throughout UPD campuses and jurisdiction.
